FAMILY SPOTLIGHT

In a quiet corner of the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU), there was a tiny warrior named Mia. Born far too early, Mia weighed just over two pounds, her skin as delicate as a rose petal. Hold the trust of those it serves and those who serve as sacred, to act with fidelity to the NFN mission at all times, and to conduct business with transparency to its community, funders and partners.






EXCELLENCE


